

# Interview with the Lindsey's By Chris Pelly

Jim and Marjorie Lindsey have been married 56 years and Jim has lived his entire life on Cisco Road. They have four children, 9 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren, all still a part of this mountain. His family's roots in Haw Creek date back to the post-civil war era. One of his sisters, Emma, lived to be

close to 100 years old when she died.

When did your family first arrive in Haw Creek? My grandfather, George Washington Lindsey, who was born in 1840 and was a civil war veteran, used his war pension to purchase 500 acres of land in the area of what is now Cisco Road and up and over Cisco Mountain into Chunns Cove. He purchased the land for \$25 or 5 cents an acre. He and my father farmed the land but slowly sold off parcels over the years. We still own over 100 acres in the upper Cisco Road area.

What was your first job?

Stocking shelves in Millers Store on Beverly Road. Pretty soon I was also driving delivery trucks for Ernest Miller. I remember the Miller family fondly all the way back to when I was a little boy and was playing in the basement of the original Millers Store (which is still located at the corner of Beverly and New Haw Creek and is now home to Dalton Carpet). In the basement I found an old scooter which N A Miller gave to me. Although I am 76 years old, I still recall this kindness of many years ago.

How did Cisco Road and Cisco Mountain get their names?

I believe it is traced back to a native American Indian named Cisco who lived on and is buried on Cisco Mountain.

Who are some other early Haw Creek families?

I remember when Haw Creek was peopled by just a few families with surnames such as Suttles, Creasman, Burnett, Hahn, Jolly and Young. After World War II major changes began. In the 1950's came the first subdivisions which slowly changed the character of Haw Creek from rural and farming to suburban and commuter in nature.

## **Evergreen Rain Garden Cleans Storm Water Run-Off**

Through a partnership with RiverLink, over \$65,000 in stormwater management initiatives were implemented to address runoff from Evergreen's parking lots, roof's and other impervious surfaces. RiverLink received monies from the North Carolina Department of Environment and Natural Resources to address non point source pollution in the urbanized areas of the Swannanoa River watershed.

"The purpose of the design is to trap, slow, and filter rainwater run-off." said Jackie Williams, Evergreen's Director. We clean the run-off from our roof and parking lot by using rain barrels, two large rain gardens which include a native wetland and several bioswales."

In Evergreen's situation the surface run-off spills into Haw Creek, which eventually drains into the Swannanoa River and the French Broad River, our region's watershed. Native creatures and plants make their homes in the affected areas. So without the cleaning process of the school's new rain garden, the storm water run-off could threaten their existence.

"The rain gardens help

prevent Haw Creek from becoming polluted," says Skye Nestler. "I think it is creative to use nature as a pollution blocker and I am looking forward to learning more about stream and water quality by studying and learning about the rain gardens."

## Is It Time to Consider City Council District Elections? Contributed by Chris Pelly

Did you know that of the last 35 seats filled on Asheville City Council only one was filled by someone from East Asheville, and that was Tommy Sellers who served from 1997 to 1999. Including the mayor, each city council has a total of seven seats. If you look at the last five election cycles dating back to 1997, a total of 35 seats have been filled, 7 seats x 5 election cycles. In that time the representation on city council has been as follows:

28804 -- 12 seats

28801 -- 10 seats

28806 -- 8 seats

28803 -- 4 seats

28805 -- 1 seat

Perhaps it is time to do what a number of other larger North Carolina cities have done, and that is elect their city councils from districts as well as at-large. Not only would district elections provide more balanced representation on city council but campaign costs would be significantly reduced as well. With some candidates spending in excess of \$40,000 to run city-wide campaigns, district elections would make the process more affordable to more candidates.

Presently, each city council member is also expected to serve all constituents equally. But is it realistic to expect each to be an expert on every Asheville neighborhood in the way they are about their own. In their own neighborhood council members know the leaders, the issues and the history of how things became the way they are. This knowledge serves to make them more effective advocates on behalf of their community. Perhaps it is time for Asheville to consider district elections. Perhaps this is a good question for the candidates.
